Hundreds of immigrants poisoned at Greek centre

ATHENS, (Reuters) - Hundreds of illegal immigrants held in a detention centre on the Greek island of Lesbos have fallen ill after drinking contaminated water from rusty and mouldy pipes, police said on Wednesday. Police said hospital staff rushed to provide emergency medication after the weekend incident at the centre, where medical charity Doctors Without Borders (MSF) denounced a "humanitarian crisis" in July. "Almost all of the immigrants at the detention centre have been poisoned," a police official, who declined to be named, told Reuters.

"They are in a bad condition, but they can not be

transferred to hospital as they are too many and in a Lesbos detention centre last month, saying Greece's bad state," the official said.

About 600 immigrants, many of them from wartorn Somalia and Afghanistan, were detained on the eastern Aegean island. The police official said water pipes at the centre were old and toilets were not working properly. Greece has been criticised internationally for the poor conditions in its six detention centres and its harsh treatment of migrants who arrived in Greece without identity papers to seek asylum from war-torn countries such as Afghanistan.

MSF ended an emergency programme at the

conservative government was providing no support for its efforts to improve conditions there.

"We hope this will finally push the government into taking some action," said Nondas Paschos, a spokesman for MSF Greece.

Greece, with just 11 million inhabitants and one of the lowest per capita GDPs in the euro zone, is struggling to cope with a rising tide of migrants swamping its long coastline and border with Turkey. Police registered 112,000 illegal migrants last year, versus just



Obama and Biden greatly respect the major contributions Greek Americans have made to so many aspects of the American experience. They will continue to work closely with Greek Americans at home and reestablish America's strong partnership with Greece and our other European allies abroad.

A Just and Lasting Political Settlement on Cyprus: As president, Barack Obama will show U.S. leadership in seeking to negotiate a political settlement on Cyprus. Hatzis heads for bright lights, big city

SEVERAL years ago, Triple M drive hosts Tony Moclair and Julian Schiller asked their producer if they could use his surname for one of their characters. Chris Hatzis happily consented, little suspecting that Greek boofhead Guido Hatzis would become a minor cultural phenomenon. "It caused my life no end of hassle," Hatzis says. "I thought it was going to be this little thing that would go away in a couple of days.'

Unlike the self-proclaimed "Greek love god", the musical tastes of the real Hatzis extend beyond the synth-rock sound of Pseudo Echo, a good reason why New York-based internet station, BreakThru Radio (www.breakthruradio.com), has just hired him as its program director.

Of course, internet radio has until very recently been seen as a nerd hobby rather than serious competition for the big commercial players, but BreakThru attracts more than 1million listeners a day. "It amazes me how many people get their new music online these days," Hatzis says. "I don't think there are many other station like this. It really is a one-stop, radio-ondemand operation. We've filled a niche in the market."

Hatzis is something of a radio guru in Melbourne, having started at TripleR in the early 1980s as a producer and presenter before a few brief stints at commercial stations such as

At the beginning of this year, he began making a show for BreakThru called Transpacific, featuring new music from Australia and New Zealand. "I'd been listening to BreakThru a bit and I was really interested in the way they had set up their station," he says. "So I sent them an email asking if I could visit the next time I came to New York. And when I met the CEO, Cal Rifkin, he asked me to do the show."

Several months later, Rifkin offered Hatzis a job as program director - on the condition he move to New York.

"I was pretty shocked," Hatzis says. "I think he asked me because he could see that I had a real passion for music - and also because somebody else had just left the station, I think that had a lot to do with it, too."

So did the 15 years he spent at ultra-credible TripleR. But BreakThru, which plays unsigned and independent artists from all genres, is not just another alternative music station - it provides aspiring musicians with a big audience, but plays their music without forcing them to sign away their rights.

Artists forgo royalties in return for exposure and can rescind the deal whenever they like - for while major artists see the internet as a threat, emerging performers view it as a Godsend.

"For a number of years now, artists have been able to bypass the old-world order and gain exposure on the internet," Hatzis says. "Sites like MySpace and iTunes are a big part of that.

"There are a lot more avenues to success for new artists now." And although a certain section of the industry is trying to put up walls and close these things down, another part has embraced the technology."

Hatzis says he wants to immerse himself in his new job before deciding whether to make any big changes to the station's program schedule. Besides, he has to get his nuptials out of the way first. "It's a bit of a shotgun wedding," he says of his impending union with his long-term girlfriend. "And the US State Department is the father holding the gun. "I really can't wait to get over there. I'm very attracted to the passion and enthusiasm of the station and I'm ready to be a part of it."
