WORK STARTS ON \$65 MILLION M5 EAST TUNNEL FILTRATION PLANT

Premier Nathan Rees inspected the site where tunnelling work will begin on the \$65 million M5 East filtration plant to improve air quality in the tunnel.

Mr Rees said the plant is the first of its kind in Australia and is part of the NSW Government's air quality improvement plan for the M5 East. "I know local families have been concerned about pollution from the tunnel and the effect it can have on their community.

"That's why we are delivering this world class filtration plant."

Mr Rees said that \$40 million was allocated in the 2008-09 Budget to continue construction of the plant which is expected to be completed by the end of this year.

"The project has already created 300 jobs with an additional 200 to come on line at its peak."

A 100-tonne road header machine is tunnelling 280 metres between the air filtration plant on the eastern side of Bexley Road and the M5 East westbound tunnel around 500 metres before the exit. "This next stage of the work involves creating a tunnel approximately eight metres wide and five metres high connecting the M5 East tunnel to the filtration plant," Mr Rees said. "More than 11,000 cubic metres of material will be excavated, with work to be carried out five and a half days a week until around late May.

"We're committed to improving air quality in and around the M5 East Tunnel."We have already put in place some immediate measures including the installation of a video detection system for illegal smoky trucks and 12 extra jet fans to improve ventilation.

"The air quality in the M5 East is monitored on a daily basis and it meets both the Department of Planning's and the World Health Organisation stringent goals."

Roads Minister Michael Daley joined the Premier today and said that underground tunnelling will take place 24 hours a day, while surface construction work will only be carried out during the day.

"The plant will extract around 50 per cent of air from the westbound tunnel and inject filtered air back into the tunnel," Mr Daley said.

"We'll be monitoring the trial closely to assess the cost of installing and operating such systems, as well as their effectiveness in removing pollutants from the tunnel air." The M5 East air filtration plant was approved in July 2007 after a rigorous and independent assessment process.
