

the lines of innovation and minimalism. You should also expect a



simple, but not simplistic approach in the direction of the play that permits the beauty of the poetry to shine and reach the audience as that's the true protagonist.

## 2009 Community Heritage Grant applications closing soon



Multicultural groups are encouraged to apply for the 2009 Community Heritage Grants, managed by the National Library of Australia, before applications close on 5 June. The grants of up to \$15 000 are available to community groups around the country to help preserve and manage locally held, nationally significant cultural heritage collections of documents and objects for future generations. Activities supported include significance assessments of collections, preservation needs assessments, purchase of archival storage materials, digitisation, conservation treatments and environmental control. Applications for grants for collection management workshops for staff and volunteers from community organisations to improve their skills when working with heritage collections are also welcome. Representatives from Indigenous and migrant community groups, historical societies, museums, public libraries and archives are encouraged to apply. Since 1994, a combined total of over \$2.8 million in funding has been provided to 661 projects.

The 2009 Community Heritage Grants Program is funded by the Australian Government through the National Library of Australia, the Department of the Environment, Water, Heritage and the Arts, the National Archives of Australia, the National Film and Sound Archive, and the National Museum of Australia.

## MINISTER TO ADDRESS PONTIAN RALLY IN GREECE

Minister for Multicultural Affairs Michael Atkinson says he is honoured to receive an invitation to speak at an annual assembly in Greece, commemorating the Genocide of Pontian Greeks between 1895 and 1925.

Mr Atkinson, who will leave for Greece on Friday, 15 May, says the Pan-Pontian Federation of Greece is funding the trip to Greece.

"I have been overwhelmed by the response from the Greek, Armenian and Cypriot communities since December, when I unveiled a plaque at the South Australian Migration Museum paying tribute to the victims of the genocide," Mr Atkinson says.

"Since then I have also moved a motion in South Australian Parliament, which recognised and condemned the genocide, and which was passed without dissent.

"I was honoured to receive the invitation from the Pan-Pontian Federation of Greece to address the rally and I am delighted to accept the invitation."

The rally will take place at Agias Sofias Square in Thessaloniki on 19 May and aims to commemorate the 353,000 victims of the genocide committed by the Young Turks and the Kemalist regime between 1916 and 1923.

The peaceful gathering of up



to 20,000 people also aims to ask for international recognition and condemnation of the genocide.

"I know from speaking to many people in the community about this issue that there are many Greek-Australians who have been deeply affected by the genocide," Mr Atkinson says.

"Many of us have known people here in Australia who experienced Turkish removal of the Greeks of Pontus, and other Greeks of Asia Minor, especially from the Aegean coast near Smyrna.

"We have their testimony, we have the admissions of officials of the Ottoman Empire and we have the shocking accounts of diplomats and consuls serving in Turkey at the time, including wartime allies of the Ottomans.

"I am privileged to be able to represent these Greek-Australians at the rally and I thank Premier Michael Rann for giving his permission to speak in Greece."
