

## Tourism with a new goal - reproduction!

During the last few years, a new form of tourism is flourishing in Greece – except for the classic one, which connected to the beaches and the islands. This is the so called "reproduction tourism," which aims for the conceiving experience!

Hundredths of couples from abroad, come to Greece in order to conceive a child with the help of the local experts for aided reproduction. According to experts 300 couples, who have not succeeded in having a baby until now, visit the country every year. Most of them come from Great Britain, Italy, neighboring Eastern countries, the US and Australia.

Why do those people chose Greece, when it comes to the most sensitive topic of conceiving? The answer is not one but three: because the success rate of the aided reproduction method is high; because the law limits are more favorable than in other countries; and because it is less expensive than in other countries.

In Greece, every cycle of artificial insemination costs about \$\mathbb{1}\$3 500, when the same procedure in the US costs over \$10 000 and in other Europeans countries it is about \$\mathbb{1}\$6 000.

Based on modern methods for aided reproduction, the success rate reaches 40% per cycle, which based on global criteria is a very high percentage. Except for this, the Greek legislature is very liberal when it comes to this method, compared to the rest of the countries.

## Grandfather of girl who survived horror balcony-fall 'would kill' father if he was allowed to see her

The grandfather of Mia Hogan, who was nearly killed at the age of two when her father jumped 50ft off a hotel balcony, has said he 'would kill' his wife's ex-husband if he were allowed to see his daughter.

John Hogan, 35, pushed son Liam, six, 50ft to his death at a Greek holiday hotel in 2006, and then jumped with Mia following an argument with thenwife Natasha Visser.

Mia and Hogan both survived, but a Greek court cleared him of murder, saying he was mentally incapable of understanding his actions.

Hogan, from Bristol, now wants to make contact with Mia - who moved to Australia with Natasha, 36 - on his return in a bid to share 'his side of the story'.

But Natasha's father Phil Steel said Hogan does not have a 'chance in hell' of seeing Mia again.

Speaking from his home in the Philippines, Phil, 62, said: 'I can't speak for my daughter, but I knew her views when it all happened.

'As far as I am concerned he has not got a chance in hell of seeing Mia.

'When she is 18 she can make her own decision. But for now - what is the man thinking of?

'Personally, I would kill him if he was allowed to see her.' Hogan was released from a Greek psychiatric hospital last Friday and will return back to the UK for further treatment this week.

He was cleared of murder by a Greek court last year after the jury ruled he suffered 'an earthquake of insanity'.
