Tensions explode in MasterChef's kitchen

A CONTESTANT has lifted the lid on MasterChef after being eliminated from the Channel 10 cooking show last night. **Geni Papacostas** said there was a lot of behind-the-scenes rivalry between contestants which viewers were not seeing in the heavilyedited TV show.

The 54-year-old was eliminated after losing a "pressure test" with Poh Ling Yeow

and Andre Ursini. The trio had to prepare a salmon mousse.

"People don't see that - people being secretive and becoming more competitive," Papacostas said.

"They (MasterChef producers) are trying to show only what will show the nice personalities for everyone."

The Brisbane-based teacher said it was back at the MasterChef house, rather than on the kitchen set, that contestants' true personalities emerge - and it wasn't always pretty.

"I would cook dinner most nights for everyone back home but people (other contestants) would not cook or get in the kitchen because they would not want to show skills or give ideas to the others," he said.

"That's what made me start wondering (about the other contestants' motives). Andre and Poh say I was used in a way

because I would give people recipes and ideas."

Papacostas said she underperformed last night because she had already decided to let Yeow and Ursini move through to the next round.

"I said before the judging 'I hope you two go ahead and do really well because I'm giving this (to) you. I'm not trying so don't let me down'.

"I didn't really want to cook against Andre and Poh - people I love. I wrote to Poh before the cook-off and said 'I feel like walking out now'.

Papacostas said she never stood a chance of taking out the competition.

The winner gets \$100,000, a publishing deal for a cook book and the chance to follow their dream career.

"I'm in my fifties and they would never give the title to someone like me," she said.

"It was mainly geared to the younger people there. It would show them a lot more."
