On the way to the reception, however, things start to go wrong... A small, yet important typo on the invitation will send everyone in different directions and transform the celebrations into the unknown.

ow it's in its 16th year the festival brings the best of Greek film and culture to the Australian shores as well as celebrating Australian born Greek talent. Over 11 days, the Palace Norton Street Cinemas, Leichhardt will screen a curated program of feature films, documentaries and short films.

Festival highlights include; Winner of the Un Certain Regard Award at the 2009 Cannes Film Festival, Yorgos Lanthimos' Dogtooth which sees a desperate father try to protect his three grown children from becoming contaminated by the outside world by confining them to a surreal domestic fantasy land; winner of numerous awards (including Audience Award and FIPRESCI Prize) at the International Thessaloniki Film Festival PVC-1, Spiros Stathoulopoulos' gripping directorial debut is inspired by a true story about a pipe bomb improvised explosive device that was placed around the



neck of an extortion victim; meanwhile Strella: A Womans Way is a drama about an extraordinary and spell binding relationship, in the glowing nights of Athens; and the search of a young American woman returning to her Greek roots in search of her real father, a drama, in Panos



Karkanevatos' Athanasia; A Well Kept Secret.

should discuss your travel plans with Centrelink before you complete your travel arrangements.

If you are leaving Australia for a short period of time, payments such as Newstart Allowance usually stop as soon as you go. Other payments such as Disability Support Pension can be paid outside of Australia for a limited period – usually for a maximum of 13 weeks.

If you intend to leave Australia permanently, most Centrelink payments stop when you go. However, some payments, such as the Age Pension, can continue if you are moving to a country where Centrelink has an international social security agreement.

Australia has social security agreements with Austria, Belgium, Canada, Chile, Croatia, Cyprus, Denmark, Germany, Greece, the Republic of Ireland, Italy, Japan, the Republic of Korea, Malta, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Portugal, Slovenia, Spain, Switzerland and the USA.
