WHEN shire resident Ada Nicodemou sets off to run across Sydney Harbour Bridge in September, her thoughts will be in far away Zambia.

Every step the Home and Away star makes from North Sydney to the Opera House will raise funds for the PixiFoto Foundation, a charity dedicated to preventing blindness among children in the Sinazongwe district in Zambia.

Ada will remember the children she met on two visits to Zambia with officials of the foundation.

"That second visit was a follow-up and such a lovely surprise to see what changes we were making," Ada said.

"The foundation uses funds raised to build wells to provide fresh water to the villages. It's as simple as that.

"Without fresh clean water, as many as 90 per cent of the village children were in danger of going blind from

from glaucoma."

Ada said she was aware of statistics from Africa that a child who loses his or her sight has less than a four-year life expectancy. As ambassador for the foundation, Ada will lead the PixiFoto team in the 2009 Blackmores Sydney Running Festival on Sunday, September 20. Reality TV auditions Coast

THE bold, beautiful and buff swamped the Gold Coast over the weekend in the hope of being selected for a new international reality show.

The show, whose title remains a secret, will feature six bachelors and bachelorettes from Australia, the UK and the US who will be flown to the Greek Isles to compete for the title of the world's most dateable single.

Producers selected the Gold Coast as the only casting call location in Australia and hopeful models, actors and regular joes flocked to Billy's Beachhouse in Surfers Paradise to audition. The lucky chosen pair will be flown to Greece this month to begin filming. Ben Parkinson casting director Glen McLaren said the Gold Coast was the ideal location for finding hot bodies suitable for television.

"I'm honestly thrilled with the amount of talent we've found here," he said.

Inspired by Boy Bands

Maroulis is a rocker in his current Broadway role and in real life, but he admits some of his influences come from other types of music he grew up with. Boy bands like New Kids on the Block and 'N Sync have surfaced within his Rock of Ages character. "I'm not much of a dancer, but I've tried to channel some of that for Rock of Ages for my 'Joshy J' moment," he says.

The singer also appreciates the classic crooners his parents enjoyed (Frank Sinatra, Nat King Cole, Perry Como and Dean Martin among them), show tunes (he likes Brigadoon and Jesus Christ Superstar, but says his favorite is West Side Story), and is using music to reacquaint himself with his Greek roots.

"We didn't listen to a lot of traditional Greek music in my house the way a lot of my Greek friends do, but I enjoy it. There's what we call Greek nights, which is basically a club night with my friends. They play a lot more of the modern music from Greece along with the traditional stuff. There's a lot bouzouki [a traditional Greek guitar] and a lot of fun," he says. "I really embrace my culture more now than I ever did."
