Katsidis ready to silence rabid crowd

It is a good thing Michael Katsidis wears a Spartan warrior helmet into the ring before his fights. The metal replica ancient helmet, which pays homage to Katsidis's Greek heritage, could offer protection from beer bombs this weekend in Las Vegas.

recting the Australian when he enters the MGM Grand Casino indoor arena will be 16,000 hyped fans, most who will baying for his blood and likely tossing beer and expletives at the 29-year-old from Toowoomba.

The bout takes place on Mexican Independence Day, the sponsor is the popular Mexican beer Tecate and the fight program, stacked with marquee match-ups headed by Mexican great Juan Manuel Marquez against arguably the world's best boxer, America's Floyd Mayweather, is designed to maximise Mexican pride.

Katsidis can expect to be the recipient of plenty of venom as he takes on rising Mexican-American fighter. Vicente Escobedo, for the World Boxing Organisation interim lightweight title.

Escobedo was a 2004 US Olympian and a member of Oscar De La Hoya's stable of young talented boxers.

"This isn't the first time I've fought in front of a crowd that is against me," said Katsidis, who is fine-tuning his preparations in Las Vegas.

"I did it in England where there were 11,000 against me.

"I did it in Houston where there were 18,000 against me.

"It is something I'm used to." The fight in England was at the

Wembley Arena in 2007 against local favourite Graham Earl. Katsidis, refusing to be intimidated,



knocked Earl down twice in the first round and again in the second before the referee stopped the fight and Katsidis was crowned in-

Katsidis lost a split points decision a year ago in front of a rabid hometown crowd in Houston, Texas to Juan Diaz, again for the WBO interim title.

The Australian broke his right hand in the second round, but almost squeezed out the win when the judges revealed their cards after 12 rounds.

There is a sound Katsidis loves almost as much as the thud of his opponent hitting the canvas.

It is the sound of silence when he is beating a hometown opponent.

"I've learned one thing," Katsidis said.

"When the crowd is quiet, that means I'm winning.

"There were a good seven rounds during that Juan Diaz fight that the crowd was quiet.

"I'm planning on making the MGM so quiet you can hear a pin drop."

Joining Katsidis and Escobedo on the Mayweather-Marquez undercard are bouts between featherweights Chris John and Rocky Juarez and Kostya Tszyu's old foe, welterweight Zab Judah, takes on Antonio Diaz.

The bouts are scheduled to begin 11am Sunday AEST.
