Man jailed for stabbing footballer

A man who stabbed a talented footballer through the heart after finding him in bed with his estranged girlfriend has been jailed for at least eight years.

Ronnie Phillip Lovett, 22, was accused of murdering George Asprogiannis, also known as George Trindall, 27, who died after being stabbed in a Bathurst house on August 10, 2008. But a NSW Supreme Court jury, sitting in Bathurst last month, found Lovett guilty of the lesser offence of manslaughter. Acting Justice Graham Barr found Lovett did not go to the house because of a loss of self-control but had gone there to "tackle" Mr Asprogiannis, arming himself with a knife in case he needed it. "He went there after due consideration, intending to exact some kind of retribution on the deceased," Acting Justice Barr said.

"The reality of what suddenly confronted the offender when he entered the house, on the other hand, must have been surprising, notwithstanding his suspicions, and in my opinion that was when he lost self-control."

The court found Lovett, who was staying at his mother's home after separating from his girlfriend Patricia Bloomfield-Gibbs, went to the house late at night after hearing about her new relationship earlier in the day. Upon finding the couple having sex, he stabbed and killed Mr Asprogiannis with a knife and then attacked him with a garden stake. Lovett then dragged Mr Asprogiannis out onto the lawn and kicked him in the jaw. Acting Justice Barr said Lovett immediately told people who had gathered that Mr Asprogiannis had attacked him and he had acted in self-defence.

"I disbelieve the offender's evidence that the deceased attacked him with the knife," Acting Justice Barr said.

AWARDED FEDERAL COMMUNITY HERITAGE GRANT

The Hellenic Historical & Cultural Centre
NSW, a department of
the Greek Orthodox

has been awarded a
\$3,520 Federal Community Heritage Grant
to fund "Preservation
and Rehousing of
Greek-Australian Wedding Crowns."

he grant, which was announced at the National Library of Australia, Canberra, on Wednesday, 11 November, will enable the Hellenic Historical & Cultural Centre NSW to properly preserve and house its extensive collection of post-WWII Greek-Australian immigrant wedding crowns, which have already featured in several exhibitions including as part of the annual Greek Festival of Sydney.

In 2009, grants worth \$383,852 were distributed to 75 community groups and organisations from around Australia to assist in

the identification and preservation of community owned but nationally significant heritage collections. National Library Director-General Jan Fullerton said the Community Heritage Grants program showed the commitment by the National Library, along with its partner institutions and the Federal Government, in encouraging communities to care for the nation's heritage, be it in small country towns or capital cities.

"It is all about working together to help spread the message that if we don't preserve our history now, it

could be lost forever," she said. "Through sharing this knowledge, the information can be taken back to the communities where it is most needed to ensure that local heritage collections are still there for future generations."

The grant money is used for significance assessment, preservation needs assessments, conservation treatments, preservation training, digitisation, and purchasing quality storage materials or environmental monitoring equipment.

The Community Heritage Grants Program is

managed by the National Library. It is funded by the Australian Government through the Department of the Environment, Water, Heritage and the Arts; the National Archives of Australia; the National Film and Sound Archive; the National Museum of Australia and the National Library.
