"TRANSITIONS" TOURING EXHIBITION

opens at Cowra Regional Gallery

The major touring exhibition Transitions: Aspects of European Island and Regional Cultures opened at Cowra Regional Gallery on Friday 18th December. At the formal launch, Gallery Director Brian Langer highlighted the exhibition "as one of the best that the Gallery has had the pleasure of hosting in recent years", and particularly congratulated participating artists on the "exceptionally high quality of work" and "their power to evoke deep emotional responses from viewers". The work of well-known Greek-Australian documentary photographer, Effy Alexakis, features strongly in the exhibition. Alexakis is one of eight artists in the show.

urated by Macquarie University Art Gallery Senior Curator Rhonda Davis and Professor Philip Hayward of the University's Department of Media, Music and Cultural Studies, the exhibition was initially launched at the Macquarie University Art Gallery early in 2008. Early in 2009 the show travelled to the La Trobe University Visual Arts Centre in Bendigo, Victoria, and later to the Flinders University City Gallery, located in the State Library of South Australia, Adelaide. Transitions will remain on display in Cowra until the 31st of January 2010.

The exhibition is sponsored by the Innovative Universities European Union Centre and aims to reflect on the

nature of European island and/or regional identities in the late 20th and early 21st centuries by intermingling representations of contemporary European identity with those of initial migrant experiences in Australia and later generational recollections or imaginings of their ancestral places.

Alexakis' mural-size photographic components in the exhibition, titled "Personal Effects" Series, features the Greek islands of Kythera, Ithaca and Kastellorizo, together with the southeastern Peloponnese. All four areas were prominent in early Greek migration to Australia.

For curator Professor Philip Hayward, Alexakis' work "illustrates the richness and complexity of contemporary migrant experience in Australia...[and] spans a range of expressions, from memory, through nostalgia, to imagination and a sense of shock, as she documents the traces of the sudden abandonment of villages in

islands such as Kythera when migrants departed, often en masse, for Australia". Hayward further states that "Alexakis' haunting photos... capture the sudden moments of migration of her grandparents' generation. Her images offset the fondly residual homes of migrant memory with poignant signs of the irrecoverable place of community memories and of the new discourses

of identity and meaning created by second and third generation migrants 'returning' to Europe's islands and regions to seek points of connection".

The other artists in the exhibition are: Angela Cavalieri, Nathalie Hartog-Gautier, Axel Poignant, Fernando Resendes, Claudia Terstappen, Jeremy Welsh and Salvatore Zofrea.

The exhibition is accompanied by a stylish seventy-two page colour catalogue, featuring all of the art works and essays by the co-curators.

With the summer school holidays upon us, those who are travelling to central western NSW for a well-earned break should take the time to drop into the Cowral Regional Gallery and view this important exhibition.
