

Greek rescue team to Haiti

A 16-member Greek rescue team, including three nurses, unit will depart for Haiti on Tuesday to offer assistance in ongoing operations in the quake-devastated Caribbean country.

"We are going to Port au Prince to offer telecommunications support to other rescue teams; the Greek team will set up a wireless web that will coordinate all the rescue teams operating in the area," team leader Alexandros Liamos said.

Meanwhile, the Hellenic Red Cross on Monday issued a plea to Greek people for financial support towards Haiti. The organisation has already sent 50,000 euros to the International Red Cross and Red Crescent organisations to cover immediate needs.



GOCMV elections proceed smoothly

Masterchef Chris Talihmanidis

CHRIS Talihmanidis was born in a tiny village in northern Macedonia in the 1930s. His parents were farmers. As Greece began to tear itself apart through civil war in the late '40s, Talihmanidis' grandmother took the teenager to work in her restaurant.

Goldstand those years and bad things happened to them," Talihmanidis says. "My grandmother wanted me to be safe, so she kept me close beside her."

Talihmanidis has been cooking professionally ever since.

He moved to Australia in the '60s and bought the Marine Cafe in Lorne in 1974, renaming it Chris's Restaurant and running it successfully for several years before buying a tiny cafe perched on a cliff near Apollo Bay. He took the name with him and in 1979, Chris's at Beacon Point was born.

Over the next 24 years, Talihmanidis gradually transformed the cafe



into a much larger - and increasingly celebrated - restaurant. Then when it was destroyed by fire in May 2003, it had to be rebuilt.

Today, with Chris still spending many hours in the kitchen (delegating some cooking duties to head chef Muhammad Ahmat and long-time life and business partner Penny Kernick), the restaurant with the peerless view remains a popular dining destination.

"I still love the Greek classics," Talihmanidis says, "but you have to be able to adapt and become more modern to keep people happy."

Australians prefer reading over sex: survey

Sex may not be all that it's cracked up to be, according to some Australians at least, who have revealed in a survey they prefer curling up with a good book rather than their lover.

When quizzed by Swedish furniture giant IKEA, one in three Aussies said that if given an extra hour in the day, they would prefer to read a book than get cosy with their other half.

The results of the online poll show 35 per cent of the 1057 respondents would opt to get stuck into a novel if they had the extra time, while only 20 per cent chose one-on-one time with their partners.

But it's apparently the nation's women who secretly yearn for paperbacks over passion, with 45 per cent saying they would opt for a good book while just 14 per cent would choose private time in the bedroom.

Men were more unlikely to snub their lovers for literature. Twenty six per cent said they would rather an hour of romance, while 25 per cent favoured reading.
