he Council of SAE Oceania & Far East Region Youth Network recently attended the World Conference for the Youth Coordinating Committees of the World Council of Hellenes Abroad in Thessaloniki Greece, from 3rd December -7th December 2009.

Representatives from the Council in attendance included; Elias Demourtzidis, Coordinator of SAE Oceania and Far East Region Youth Network, Anthony Zorbas (W.A),

Makrina Tsinoglou (Tasmania), Alexandra Georgiou (QLD), Alex Belerhas (N.S.W), Rebecca Kougellis (A.C.T), Callie Kalimniou (VIC) and Elinah Ioannides (VIC).

The official opening was announced by the Mayor of Thessaloniki, Mr. Vassilis Papageorgopoulos, at the Grand Palace Hotel in Thessaloniki.

The youth were addressed by various speakers including; Mr. Stefanos P. Tamvakis President of SAE, and Mr. Andrew Athens, the Honorary SAE President, who served as the first President in 1995 for the Founding Assembly of the World Council of Hellenes Abroad.

Testament to the Conference's motto "The Future is Here", the purpose of this Conference was to give the youth the opportunity to identify the issues concerning the youth of the Diaspora, and through open workshops conclude with practical and strategic recommendations on how to best address the issues.

Sixty young Hellenes from the world Coordinating Councils of the SAE Youth Network, and the NEPOMAK Network (World Organisation for Young Overseas Cypriots) met to discuss and develop specific proposals which centred on the following 6 themes:

Culture, Education and the Greek Language, and the Repatriation of the Parthenon Marbles;

Social Activities, specifically the Environment, and Greek Communities Abroad and Youth Involvement;

Professional and Vocational Guidance for Youth;

Philoxenia: Hospitality Programmes in Greece;

Communication: More effective operation of Youth Networks, and Communication between SAE regions; and

The creation of a Hellenic Database: Census of all Hellenic Youth Organisations worldwide.

A number of innovative ideas and proposals were created by the youth, and presented in a joint meeting with Mr. Spiros Kouvelis, Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs.

The Deputy Minister congratulated the youth on their proposals, and on their campaign to promote the repatriation of the Parthenon Marbles, Unite the Marbles, which according to Mr. Kouvelis, is an issue of critical importance. He further reassured the youth that their activities will be supported by the Greek Government, and emphasised the need for Greece to recognise the critical issues which are being faced by the Diaspora, and more importantly, the recognition of those issues which will be faced by the future generations of the Diaspora.

Along with the workshops, each region was given the opportunity to present to the Coordinating Committees initiatives from their own regions. The

Youth Council of SAE Oceania & Far East Region took this opportunity to promote the launch of the animated Bilingual DVD "My First Words -Greek and English" created by Greek-Australian, Tony Kyriacou. The DVD is aimed at children from one to eight years old, and teaches them basic Greek words.

The final day of the Conference saw the SAE Youth Network launch the Unite the Marbles campaign, at the New Acropolis Museum in Athens. This campaign is an online petition requesting for the re-unification of the Parthenon Marbles to Athens. The website www.unitethemarbles.org is in six different languages: English; Greek; Russian; French; Arabic; Portuguese and Spanish, and seeks to raise awareness across the globe about the plight for the return of the Marbles.

The Council believes that the actions of the Youth of the Diaspora around the world have finally taken shape, and that the Conference was an overwhelming success.

According to the Council, this Conference gave the youth an opportunity to meet and work with other young like -minded Hellenes from around the world, who have the common objective of promoting Hellenism in the Diaspora.

The Council looks forward to a busy year ahead, implementing these new initiatives in the Oceania and Far-East Region.
