Greece caught up in an all-out flour war


GREEKS have put their economic woes behind them by getting rid of their frustrations with a mass flour fight. The bizarre tradition, known as the Flour War, involved thousands of people dressing up in plastic suits and goggles to do battle on the streets of a small fishing village.



VILLAGERS, joined by out-of-towners, were split into two gangs to fight it out with coloured flour bombs in the center of Galaxidi. But the scenes were a little friendlier than those in Athens last week. There, thousands of people protested government plans to cut public sector wages and hike taxes to deal with the country's massive budget deficit. Participants said the tradition, in which 3,300 pounds of flour were used, was a great way of releasing frustration as the country suffers the worst economic crisis in its history. The tradition was believed to have originated in 1801, when Galaxidi residents defied their Ottoman rulers by celebrating the forbidden Carnival festival and painting their faces with ash while dancing.
