# Labor's 'fresh new face' is a seasoned party operator

She is being hailed by party bosses as a "fresh face" for Labor in the Legislative Council who represents a clean break from the factional appointments of the past.

ut there is little doubt that Sophie Cotsis is very familiar with how government oper-

The 37-year-old worked as an adviser to the former NSW transport minister Michael Costa, before stepping into a private sector job with the multinational infrastructure company Parsons Brinckerhoff in March 2008. She has advised the company, which since 1999 has donated almost \$100,000 to the NSW branches of the Labor and Liberal parties, on how to deal with government.

Parsons Brinckerhoff was involved in construction of the Lane Cove Tunnel and the Epping to Chatswood rail line.

A company spokeswoman said Ms

Cotsis was employed to "help the firm Legislative Council position yesterday with its understanding about government. What government requires, how it works".

Now, two years on, Ms Cotsis is set to jump back into government, this time as a Labor MLC.

She is one of four new faces due to be elected to the Legislative Council in a joint sitting of Parliament this

The others are the former head of the Nature Conservation Council, Cate Faehrmann, and Woollahra councillor David Shoebridge, both of the Greens, and the former head of the Game Council NSW, Robert Borsak, of the Shooters Party.

However, the new MLCs will not be sworn in by the NSW Governor, Marie Bashir, until Friday. This means they will not be allowed to take their seats and vote on legislation until September 21, the next time the Legislative Council

Ms Cotsis was preselected for the

by a unanimous vote of the party's administrative committee following her endorsement by Labor's dominant Centre Unity faction on Friday.

The only other candidate, Ashfield councillor Lucille McKenna, positioned herself as an anti-head office candidate.

A senior Labor source yesterday insisted Ms Cotsis was "a quality candidate" who has "future potential" and "the type of person NSW Labor needs to be preselecting more of".

However, her selection has upset some party members, who criticised the "behind closed doors" selection process. Three Labor councillors, Darcy Byrne of Leichhardt, Alex Lofts of Ashfield and Mary O'Sullivan of Marrickville, issued a statement supporting Ms McKenna and calling for future positions to be filled by a rank and file ballot.

"It is important for the future of the Labor Party that rank and file candi-

dates like Lucille, who have real world experience, continue to put their hands up to be parliamentarians," Mr Byrne

A Greens MLC, John Kaye, criticised the method of her appointment. "Ms Cotsis's easy moves from a ministerial office to a corporation with substantial dealings with government and then into the Parliament will reinforce the strong perception that the NSW government is captive to cronyism and powerful minority interests," he said.
