One Million More Reasons to Stay Sober Behind the Wheel

Minister for Police Michael Daley and Minister for Roads David Borger today announced that the NSW Government would spend an additional \$1 million over the next six weeks as part of Operation Maintain.

Mr Daley said the extra funding would be used to boost the number of RBT operations conducted across the state.

"Operation Maintain commences this week and will continue up until the commencement of state-wide Christmas operations," he said.

"The money will only be spent for RBTs, which means motorists will see an immediate and significant increase in the number of police on the roads pulling cars over for random testing.

"At the end of the day, we don't want a single family to suffer the heartbreak of spending Christmas without a loved one because of the selfish and thoughtless actions of drunk driver."

NSW Police conduct an average 4 million random breath tests every single year. An average of 2000 people are caught drink driving every month.

Mr Borger said that \$1 million in RTA funding was on top of the budget already allocated for RBT operations this holiday season.

"Motorists should be aware that that the odds of being caught if you drink and drive this holiday season are now higher than ever," he said.

"Unfortunately, we've already seen more than 20,700 drivers caught for drink driving this year," he said.

"I hope this is a sobering thought for anyone thinking they might try their luck after a couple of drinks."

Assistant Commissioner Traffic Operation John Hartley said Operation Maintain is one of several holiday road



safety operations aimed at deterring and detecting those who choose to risk their lives and that of others on the road.

"Drink driving is the number one focus for General Duties and Highway Patrol officers on the roads over the next

six weeks," he said.

"There will be RBT operations at all hours of the day and night across the entire State which means that Sydney metropolitan areas and regional areas are being targeted."

Information Sessions about Prescribed Medicine Safety in Greek, Mandarin/Cantonese and Vietnamese
