## Australian Commemoration at the Athens' Commonwealth War Cemetery

embers of Australia's Federation Guard (AFG) led a ceremony at the Phaleron Commonwealth War Cemetery in Athens, Greece, to commemorate the 70th Anniversary of the Battle of Greece and Crete. Present at the 18 May ceremony were six Australian veterans of the conflict, officials from the Departments of Veterans' Affairs and Defence, and Greek member of the Australian Parliament, the Hon. Steve Georganas.

The Commanding Officer of the AFG contingent Lieutenant Luke Haitas said that the catafalque party had conducted an excellent and moving ceremony at the beachside cemetery. "The commemoration went well and it was quite emotional for both the soldiers and the veterans," Lieutenant Haitas said. "I'm very proud of the guard in conducting what was a dignified and solemn ceremony to remember those Australians that died defending Greece during the German invasion."
