Hellenic Olympic Committee protests wrestling decision

The Hellenic Olympic Committee announced on Wednesday it fully supports the Greek wrestling federation's fight against Tuesday's decision by the International Olympic Committee (IOC) to remove wrestling from the program for the 2020 Olympics.

«This is one decision that is clearly at variance with the history of the Olympics and sport in general. There should be a revision of this decision and the Hellenic Olympic Committee will support with all its forces, any effort in this direction,» the announcement by the Greek committee said.

«As is known throughout the world, the sport of wrestling has its roots in ancient Greece and has been an event from the beginning of the programme of the Olympic Games in antiquity and in the first modern Olympics in Athens in 1896.»

On Tuesday Greek wrestling federation president Kostas Thanos said the decision by the IOC was «sacrilege.»

«Wrestling is a sport that is identified with the Olympics and we cannot throw away a symbol such as wrestling. The way they are going they may even remove the name Olympics,» Thanos said in a radio interview.

New law will only allow investors to lease Greek islands

The government submitted an amendment on Wednesday that would only allow investors to lease, rather than buy, islands and would require various ministries and the heads of the armed forces to approve the transaction.

The legislation tabled by Defense Minister Panos Panayiotopoulos requires the heads of the Defense and Public Order ministries to approve the lease of any Greek islands.

The approval of military chiefs would also be needed before the lease could go ahead.

The amendment means that no investor could buy a Greek island, only lease it for a specific period of time, Panayiotopoulos said.



Difficult year ahead for Cypriot tourism

This year is poised to be a difficult one for Cypriot tourism, the island's Energy, Industry and Tourism Minister Neoklis Sylikiotis stated on Tuesday, noting that 2012 was a very positive year both in terms of arrivals and revenues.

The economic challenges the island is facing, as well as the negative climate internationally, mean that Nicosia would be happy if tourism remained at the same level as in 2012, when it reached 2.46 million arrivals, up by 3 percent from 2011, and posted a 10 percent annual increase in revenues. While the Russian market is set to show further increase, Sylikiotis said, arrivals from the United Kingdom, Germany and the Scandinavian countries are expected to drop.

King George Hotel closes for full facelift

The King George Hotel at Syntagma Square shut down on Wednesday as a complete renovation gets under way, part of its investment program.

The hotel, leased by Lampsa SA, which owns the adjacent Hotel Grande Bretagne, has closed down following its handover by the previous leasing company. Lampsa expects the five-star unit to reopen in mid-May or by early June at the latest.

According to the estimates Lampsa had made before receiving the hotel, the investment will cost between 1.5 million and 2 million euros.

The agreement for the 20-year lease of King George provides for a minimum annual rent of 700,000 euros, plus an extra payment based on the hotel's turnover.
