## OK: Do your kids play football in Greece?

MV: Three of my four sons play. All three play at Panionios Academy. Dimitri in the Under 15s, Yianni in the Under 13s and Alexandros in the Under 10s. Philopos, my 10-year-old doesn't play, though we all joke that he is their agent. He will make money on them not having to run or kick a ball.

They are learning the game in a good environment under some good guidance. Playing football in Holland and Greece has been a great experience for them. They are loving their football at the moment and this has really helped in their move from Holland to settle in quicker.

OK: Do you miss Australia?

MV: Yes and no. Funnily enough Melbourne is home but for more than half of my life I have lived away from Melbourne. I miss family and friends in Melbourne. I love what I do and I am privileged to be doing it in Europe. It's not easy for Australian coaches to coach in Europe. Europe is the Mecca of football. People live and breath it. It's a religion. I love living in Europe. Travelling, learning, experiencing. We only live once. Really, I've been so fortunate that through my passion I have seen so much of the world. I'll be coming back to Melbourne for a bit of a break to catch up and see family and friends. Hopefully I can come with the Greek national team in the future .... You never say never.
