## 1821-2021: The Free and Brave Hellenes




### Sunday 20 June

## How are the Mighty Fallen? Athens under Roman Rule



#### Wednesday 23 June

A talk by Professor Ian Worthington In 338 BC Athens lost its independence when Philip II of Macedon defeated a Greek army at Chaeronea. The Greeks lived under Macedonian rule until Rome annexed them into its empire in the mid-second century BC. The common opinion is that Athens did a disappearing act, as its democracy was curtailed, it became a provincial town, and the Athenians had to share Athena's sacred home on the Acropolis with the goddess Roma. But this talk shows how in reality Athens was still a vibrant and influential city. Its classical self lived on in literature and thought, and its cultural brilliance attracted Roman visitors and influenced Roman culture.
